**Field Trip Report: Stanislaus National Forest  
Calaveras Ranger District, Domingo Project**

Trip date: November 15, 1995

Consultations with local Native Americans were conducted at the Mi-Wok Ranger District on November 13. They were not available for this field visit.

The Domingo Project includes part of the 18,500-acre fire in 1992. This site situated at 2,400 to 3,700 ft elevation has very steep terrain and poor accessibility. It has been planted with mixed conifers and about 300 acres were treated in the spring of 1995 with liquid hexazinone using ground broadcast spray. Last application of 2% glyphosate has been scheduled for mid-April of 1996. Major established oak species, such as black oak and valley oak, were being protected from herbicide sprays.

There are only a few species of interest that occurred sparsely throughout, these include deerbrush, manzanita, and oak.

This site will not be monitored for herbicide residues, since all treatment will end in spring and herbicide and plant species combinations are available and more accessible in other sites within the Stanislaus National Forest. We will focus our monitoring efforts on the Paper Project and Hamm-Hasloe/Groveland Conifer Release II areas.
