TO: COUNTY AGRICULTURAL COMMISSIONERS

SUBJECT: APPROVED CHOLINESTERASE TESTING LABORATORIES

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Attached is the current list of Laboratories Approved to Perform Cholinesterase Testing for Occupational Health Surveillance, dated January 1, 2005. There are a few changes in the contact persons, but the most significant change is the change in address for Pacific Toxicology. No laboratories are either added or deleted in the January 1, 2005 list. This list is also available on the DPR website at: <http://www.dhs.ca.gov/ehlb/BioChem/CHE%20LAB%20list.pdf>.

In May 1999, a new regulation (3 CCR 6728) required that only laboratories meeting specific analytical criteria could be used in the medical supervision program. All laboratories analyzing blood cholinesterase (ChE) for the medical supervision program must report the results in the same units. Prior to 1999, different laboratories reported ChE in different units depending on the analytical method used. By reporting in different units, health professionals and regulatory officials were often unable to compare baseline ChE results to illness results, if the blood was analyzed at different laboratories. Since that time, staff from the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR), Office of Environmental Health Hazard Assessment, and Department of Health Services (DHS) with invaluable assistance from Dr. Barry Wilson at UC Davis, have been working with the laboratories to help them comply with the regulatory requirements.

Reasons for a shorter list of ChE labs include: some labs decided not to participate in the comparison studies; some labs could not meet the regulatory requirements for the comparison study results; and some labs are still working on compliance. The laboratories on the new list meet the analytical criteria set forth in 3 CCR 6728.

Since the list of approved laboratories is much shorter, you may want to contact employers in your county to ensure that their medical supervisor uses an approved laboratory to analyze blood cholinesterase.
