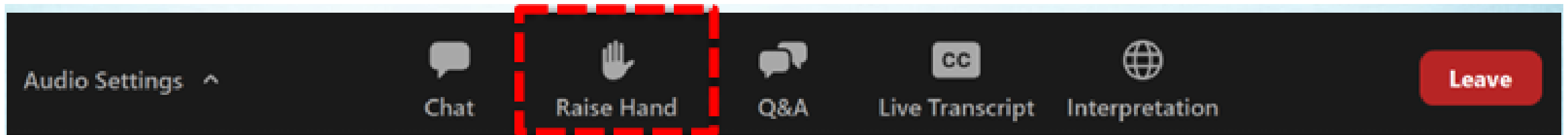

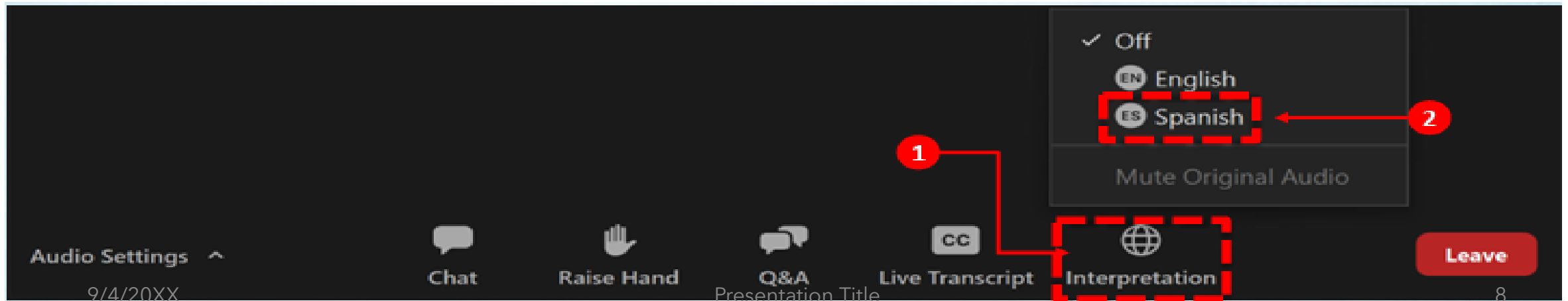

Statutory Requirements in AB 652

- The EJAC members will:
 - Be nominated by an organization that seeks to achieve EJ.
 - Be appointed by DPR's Director
 - Meet 2 times per year
 - Work in consultation with DPR to establish a Charter
 - Serve in an advisory capacity to provide prioritized recommendations to DPR

Committee Document Development

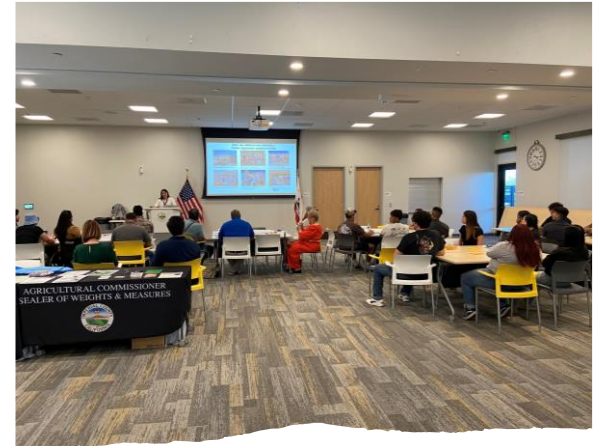
Types of Committee Documents

- **Scope of Work:** Outlines the EJAC's objectives, goals, and the roles and responsibilities of both the EJAC members and DPR.
- **Scoring Criteria:** Outlines how DPR will evaluate the EJAC membership applications based on qualifications, contributions, and alignment with AB 652.
- **Draft Charter:** Details the EJAC's advisory role, governance structure, term limits, member application process, and the procedure for submitting recommendations to DPR, as required by AB 652.

Proposed Draft Committee Charter

The Draft Charter details the EJAC's advisory role, governance structure, term limits, member application process, and the procedure for submitting recommendations to DPR, as required by [AB 652](#).



Draft Charter

Purpose, Overview, & Advisory Role

- The Environmental Justice Advisory Committee (EJAC) was established by [AB 652](#) to provide prioritized recommendations to the Department of Pesticide Regulation (DPR) on ways to integrate environmental justice (EJ) considerations into department programs, policies, decision-making, and activities, and on how the department can improve its engagement with communities with the most significant exposure to pesticides.
- The EJAC is an advisory body, with DPR's Director maintaining final decision-making authority.

Governance Structure

- The EJAC is a “state body” and subject to the Bagley-Keene Open Meeting Act.
- 7-11 members with defined representation.
- The EJAC will meet in public, hybrid meetings as a quorum two times per year, with one meeting held in high pesticide-use areas.

Member Application Process & Term Limits

Application Process

Members of the EJAC will be appointed by the DPR Director from nominations received from environmental justice organizations, community groups, or other organizations or entities implementing program work that seeks to achieve environmental justice as defined in Section 65040.12 of the Government Code through an open, public process. (Food & Agr. Code, § 11519, subd. (c).)

Term limits:

- Members serve 3-year terms; may serve up to two terms.

Alternates:

- Appointed by DPR Director in the same manner as the EJAC members.

Resignations:

- Submitted in writing
- 10 days in advance of the next EJAC Meeting



Process for Identifying Prioritized Recommendations

- The EJAC works with DPR staff to identify prioritized topics for EJAC's consideration.
- Public comment should inform recommendations submitted by the EJAC to DPR.
- Recommendations shall be approved by majority vote when quorum is present.

Removal of Members

The determination to remove a committee member of the EJAC falls within the Director's authority. A member of the EJAC may be removed under these circumstances:

- **Committee's 2/3 vote**
- **Reasonable cause**
- **Missing 2 or more consecutive meetings of the EJAC**

Chair / Co-Chair(s): Election and Roles

Election

- The EJAC elects the Chair or up to two Co-Chairs by majority vote.
- Elections occur during a public meeting of the EJAC.



Role of Chair / Co-chair(s)

- Presides over meetings.
- Leads agenda development with DPR staff.
- Coordinates deliverables and recommendation submission.
- Serves as primary point of contact for the EJAC.

What is a Pesticide Use Report (PUR)? ²

- PURs: Forms sent by applicators to the County Agricultural Commissioners in the county where the applications took place.
- PURs require different types of information depending on the type of application:
 - 'Ag' PURs: Production agricultural applications (Ex: orchard, field, vegetable crops, etc.)
 - PUR = single application
 - 'Non-Ag' PURs: Everything else legally required to be reported (Ex: post-harvest, structural, rights of way, etc.).
 - PUR = monthly summary
- Information from these PURs are sent to DPR where they are housed in a large historical database going back to 1990
- Currently the database contains 108 million records
 - 82%: Ag PURs
 - 18%: Non-Ag PURs

Not Required to be Reported

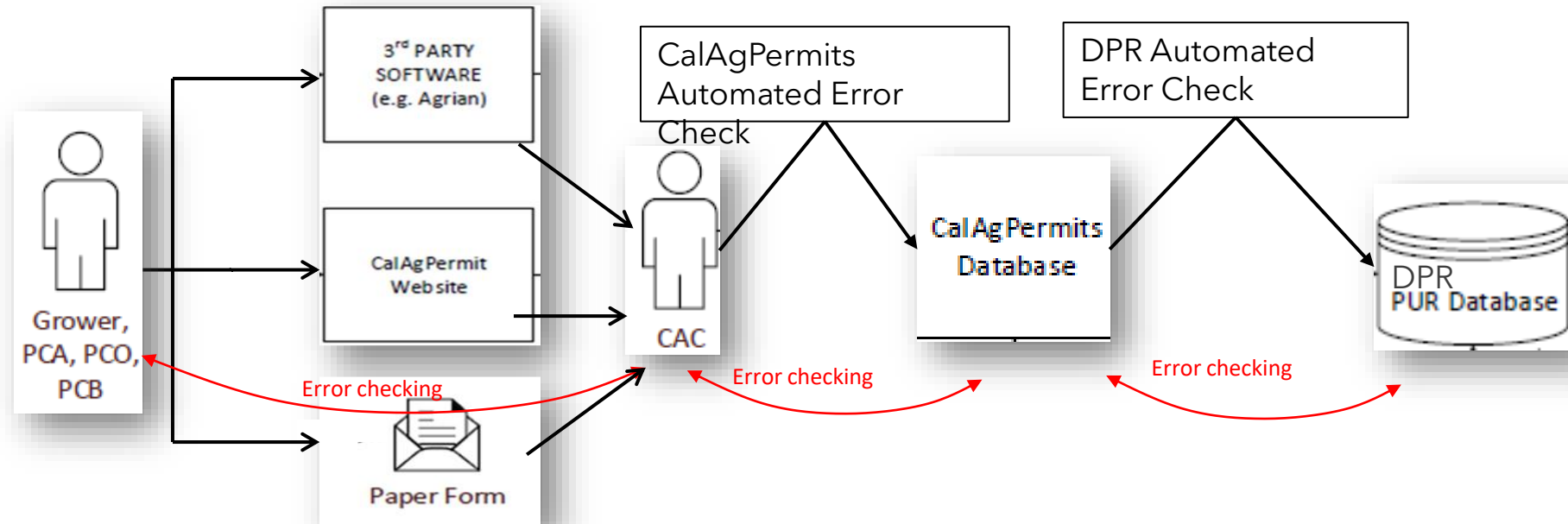
Pesticide applications for the following:

- Home and garden use done by the resident
- Most industrial and institutional uses
- Veterinary applications
- Use of FIFRA 25b pesticides (min. risk)
- Applications applied by federal employees on federal land
- Applications applied by tribal members on tribal lands

How does a PUR get from applicator to DPR?

County Agricultural Commissioner's (CAC) Offices

(County regulatory agencies that enforce pesticide use laws and regulations)



Applicators:

- Grower
- Ag and Non-Ag pest control business (PCB)
- Maintenance gardeners
- Any other licensed professional pest control operator (PCO) or advisor (PCA) applying a pesticide required to be reported

CalAgPermits:

- Statewide, web-based system to enter and transfer PURs, Notices of Intent (NOIs), etc.
- Implemented in 2011

How is the PUR data used?

PUR data is used by:

- Government agencies
- Educational institutions
- Environmental groups
- Public interest organizations
- Research companies
- Legal institutions
- General public
- And many more....

PUR data is used in decisions affecting human and environmental health, including:

- Estimating dietary risk
- Ensuring compliance with clean air and water laws and regulations
- Evaluating reduced-risk pest management alternatives
- Determining potential endangered species habitat issues
- Calculating VOC emissions in nonattainment areas
- Evaluating possible human illness clusters
- Informing regulatory work and directions
- Contributing to determination of grant goals and objectives
- Creating annual PUR Report containing many commonly requested tables/graphs

What is reported in a PUR?

Who?

- Permit /operator ID number/ Grower ID
- Structural/Non-Ag business license number

What?

- Name and registration number of product
- Crop, commodity, or site treated

Where?

- County name and number
- 1x1 Square mile section
- Site ID (name of field)

When?

- Date/time application started and completed
- Month of application

How?

- Method of application (air, ground, fumigation, other)
- Fumigation method code (if required)
- Preplant (if applicable)

Pesticide Use Measures:

1. Amount (Ag and Non-Ag)
 - Undiluted product
 - Pounds of active ingredient
2. Area (acres totals are mostly Ag)
 - Ag: acres treated and planted
 - Non-Ag: usually volume/weight, or not required to be reported
3. Applications (better for Ag only)
 - Number of applications of each product or active ingredient

Pesticide Use Measure Comparison

Pound of Active Ingredient Applied

- Used most often
- Ag and Non-ag PURs
- Emphasizes pesticides applied at high use rates
 - Fumigants
 - Kaolin clay (biopesticide) and oils

Acres Treated

- Second most popular
- Mostly just Ag PURs
- Cumulative summation
- Reflects application frequency and geographic coverage - not influenced by pesticides with high application rates that drive rankings by pounds applied

Application Counts

- Limited use
- Ag and Non-ag PURs
- Limited utility due to:
 - Inconsistencies in reporting methodologies , esp. for Non-ag Use
 - Not required for structural pesticide use reporting
 - Not used in annual PUR reports

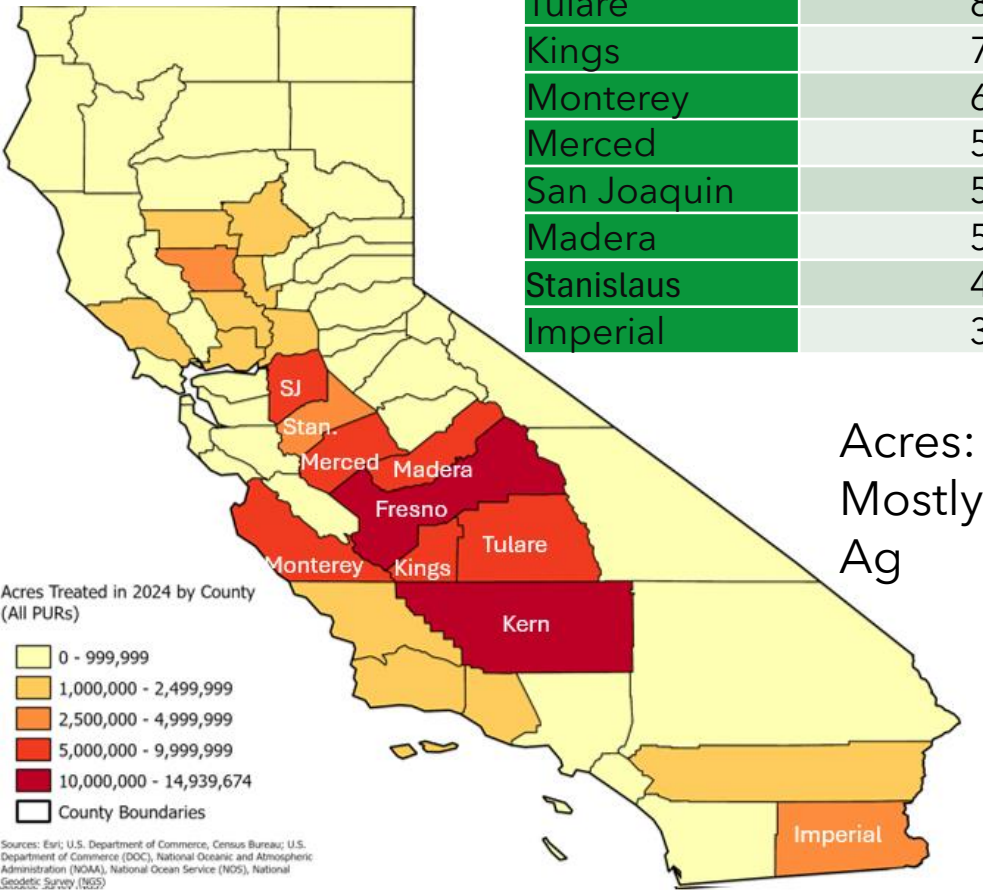
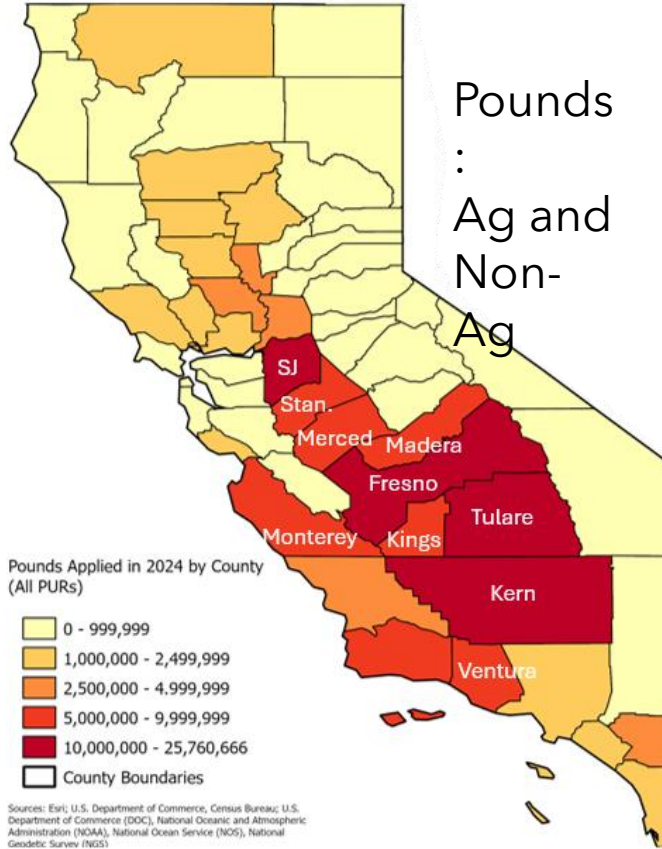
Which to use?

- There is no single answer to this question
- Depending on the questions being asked, one use measure may serve better than others
- By considering all three measures together, it is possible to get a more nuanced understanding of many pesticide use patterns and trends

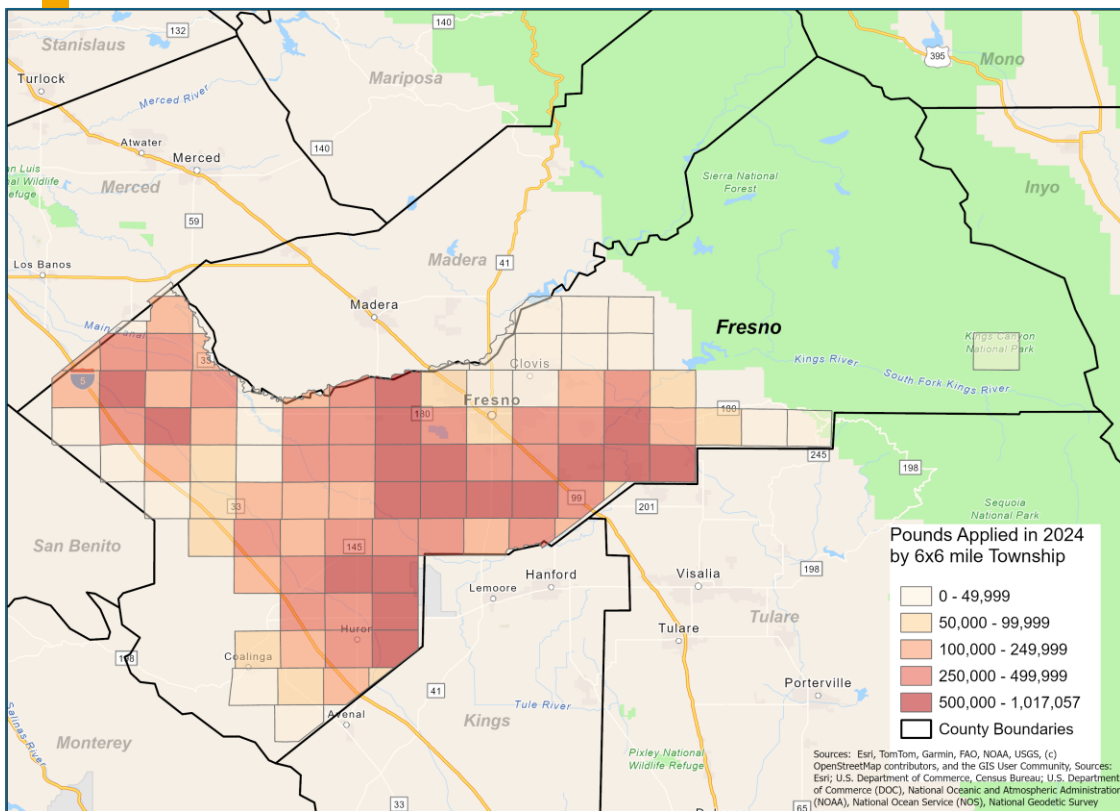

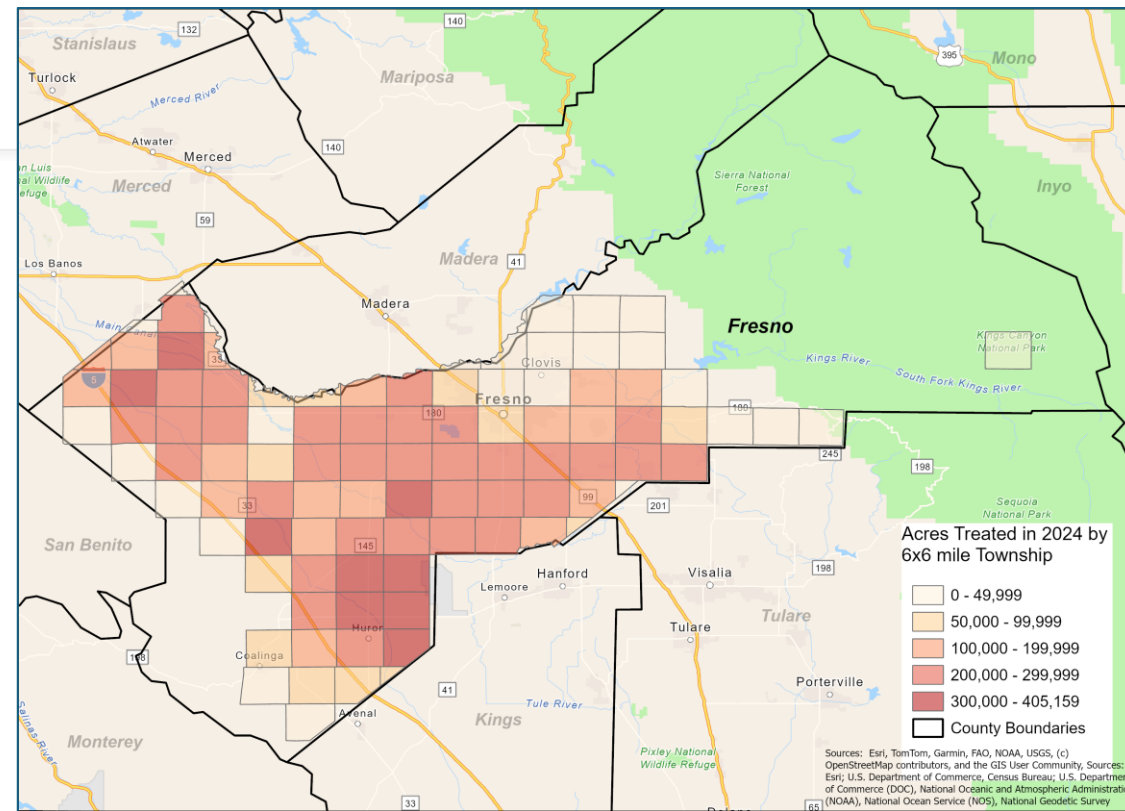

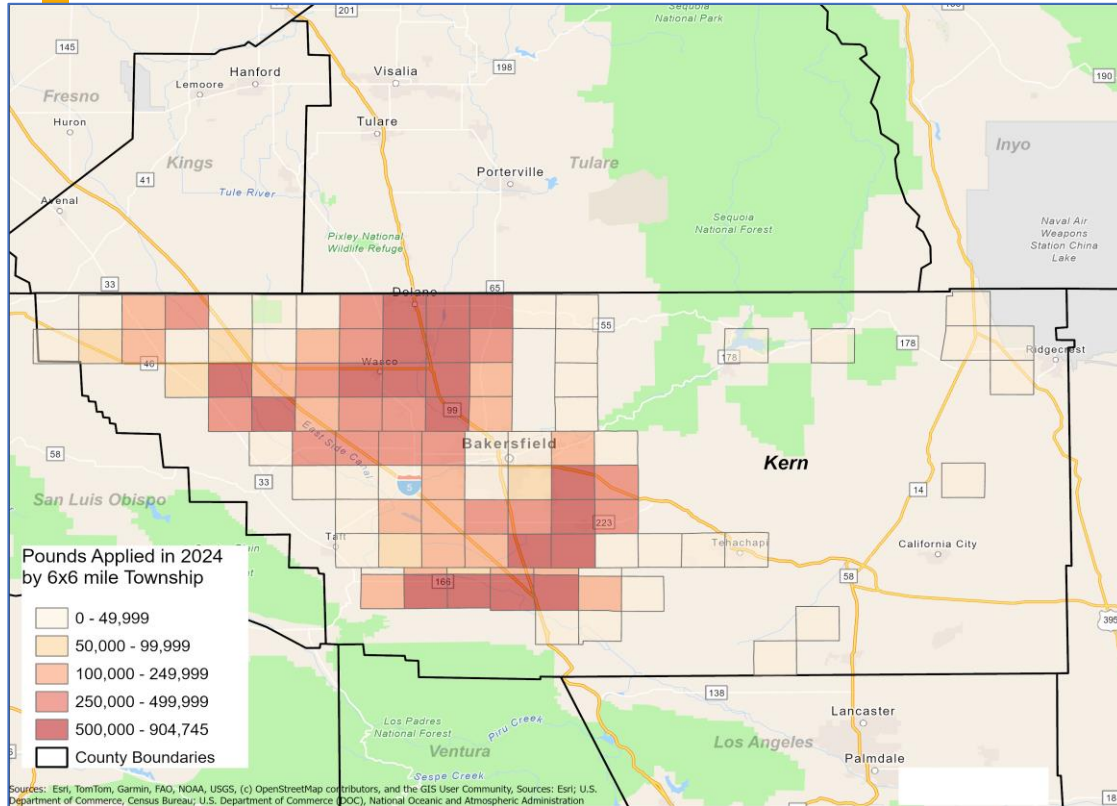

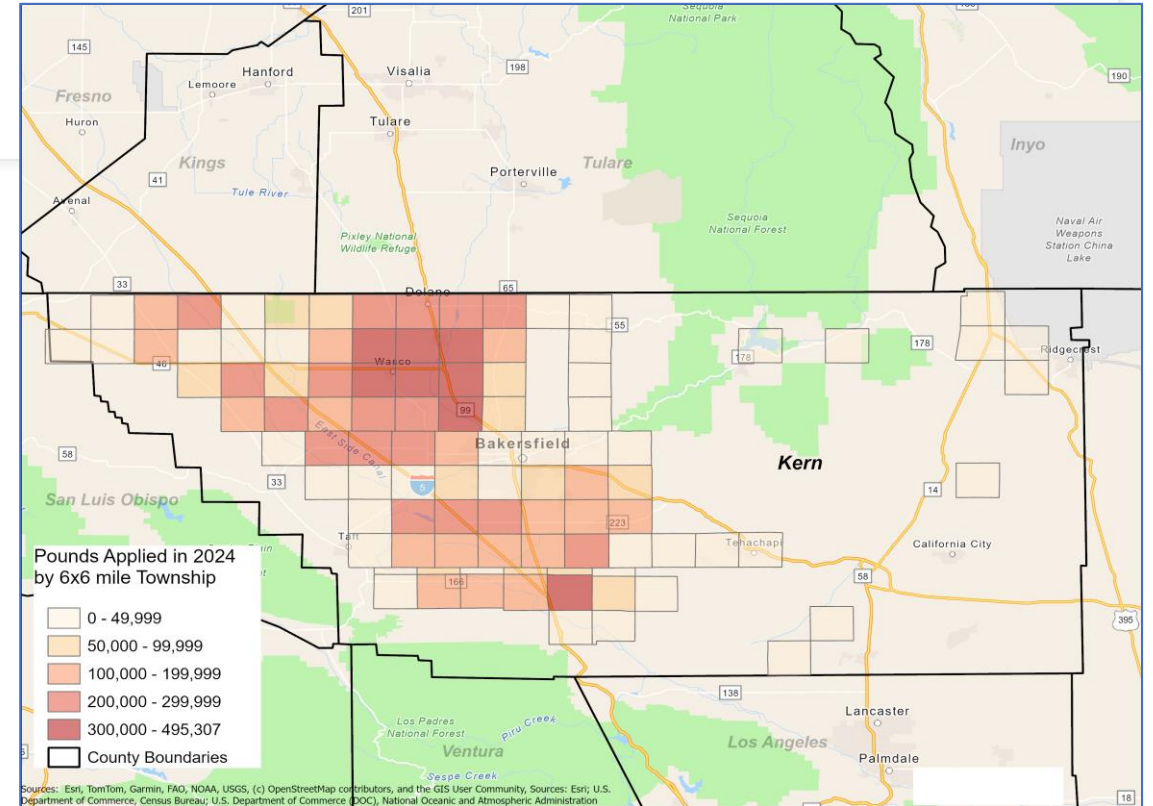

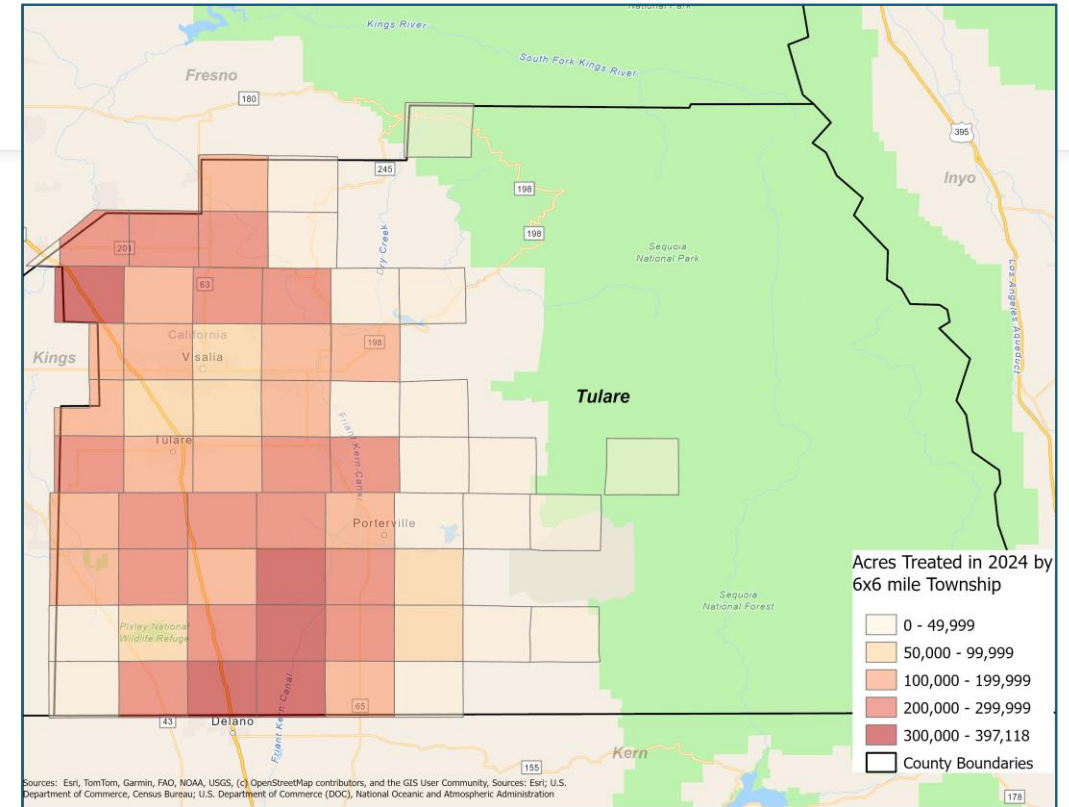
